Results illuminate the cinematic portrayal of cyberbullying, misinformation, invasion of privacy, and the erosion of authentic connections, contributing valuable insights to the discourse on social media's darker aspects. Implications of this study extend to both academia and society at large. By leveraging cinematic portrayals, this research enhances our understanding of the nuanced and multifaceted aspects of social media's negative impact. The identified themes serve as a foundation for developing strategies to mitigate the adverse consequences of social media use. ## **Objectives:**

## **Methodology**

4. Reviewing Themes: Refining themes by checking if they work in relation to the coded extracts and the entire data set.
5. Defining and Naming Themes: Conducting a detailed analysis to define and refine the specifics of each theme, generating clear definitions and names.

### ***Analytical Approach***

The analysis acknowledges the complexity of cinematic portrayals of social media dangers by aiming for a nuanced understanding of the depicted issues. This approach explores the intricacies and subtleties in the films' depictions, moving beyond simplistic categorizations to unravel deeper layers of meaning embedded in the narratives. ## **2. Unified Theory of Acceptance and Use of Technology (UTAUT):**

UTAUT, developed by Venkatesh et al. (2013) provides a comprehensive framework for understanding the factors influencing the acceptance and usage of technology. The theory identifies four key constructs: Performance Expectancy, Effort Expectancy, Social Influence, and Facilitating Conditions (Venkatesh et al., 2013). In the context of this research, UTAUT serves as a lens to analyse the characters' attitudes and behaviours toward social media within cinematic narratives. By exploring how the characters perceive the benefits and challenges of social media, and the social influences shaping their interactions, UTAUT contributes insights into the motivational and contextual factors influencing the portrayal of social media's impact on society.

By integrating SCT and UTAUT, this research aims to offer a more nuanced understanding of the cinematic depictions of the dangers of social media. SCT provides a psychological foundation, emphasizing the observational learning and modelling processes, while UTAUT contributes insights into the motivational and contextual factors influencing characters' acceptance and use of social media within the narrative. Together, these theories form a robust theoretical framework that addresses both the cognitive and behavioural dimensions of social media portrayal in the selected films.

Through this integrated lens, the research seeks to uncover the complexities of how characters navigate the digital landscape, shedding light on the psychological and motivational aspects that drive their interactions with social media.
